- ♦ More than 180 first team All-Americans

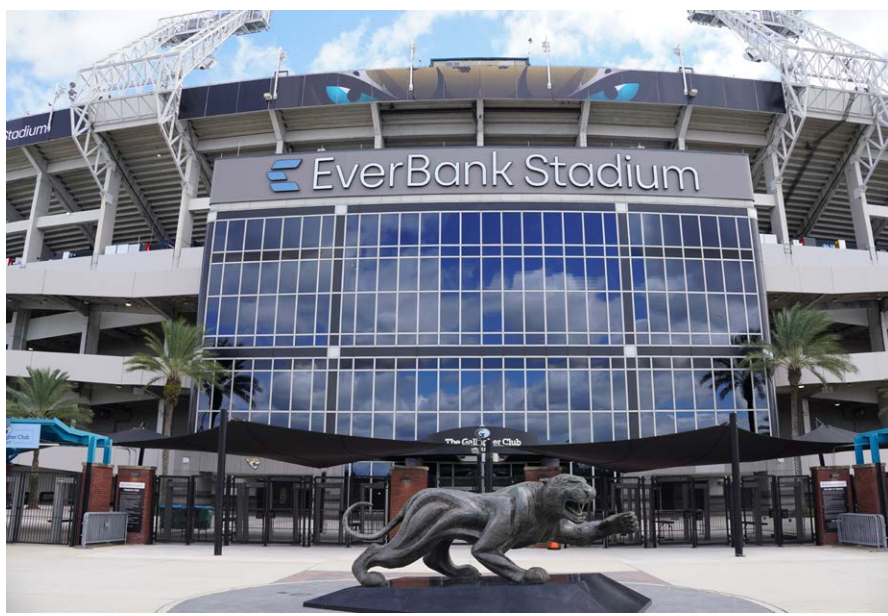

TRADITIONS

Celebrating its 81st game, the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl has provided Florida's First Coast with a solid economic impact as well as exciting post-season football for more than 80 years. Through its storied history, the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl is proud to be the sixth-oldest college bowl game and first game ever televised coast-to-coast.

The TaxSlayer Gator Bowl tradition began in 1945 when a group of Jacksonville businessmen, led by Charles Hilty Sr., started the first concentrated drive at establishing a post-season college football game. The group, coordinated by the Downtown Lions' Club, included Maurice Cherry, Raymond McCarthy Sr., Walter McRae Sr., W.C. Ivey, W.E. (Ted) Arnold, Peyton B. (Pete) Burkhalter, George Robinson, Steven Freel Sr., Barrington Darby Sr., Sam Butz Sr., Charles R. Thebaut Sr. and Van Fletcher Sr.

The inaugural Bowl pitted Wake Forest against South Carolina on New Year's Day 1946 (Wake Forest won 26-14) with a payout of \$10,000 to each team. Since then, the success of the bowl has poured millions of dollars into college athletics and has entertained millions of fans.

The status of the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl has evolved through the years. As noted above, the 1955 game was the first coast-to-coast telecast of a bowl game (Vanderbilt / Auburn) and the game has been televised nationally every year since.

TV NETWORK: ESPN

Play-by-Play Commentator: Bob Wischusen

Bob Wischusen has been a play-by-play voice on ESPN and ABC's college basketball and football telecasts since he joined ESPN in July 2005. He also called play-by-play for ESPN's Arena Football (AFL) telecasts for two years (2006-08), as well as radio/TV coverage of the PGA Championship, US and British Open for golf and college baseball. In 2021, he added NHL play-by-play duties to his resume, providing commentary for select NHL games.

Wischusen has been the radio play-by-play voice for the New York Jets since 2002. He also worked from 2001-08 for the MSG Networks (Madison Square Garden) where he handled play-by-play on TV and radio for select Knicks, Rangers and Liberty games.

At MSG, Wischusen served as a key component in the launch of FSNY's ambitious Regional Sports Report – New York Edition and co-hosted Talk of Our Town (2002-2003), as well as occasionally anchoring Sports Desk.

From 1997-2000, he called New Jersey college football, basketball and baseball games for the Comcast network, and from 1996-2001 he worked at WFAN-AM in New York as a talk show host and update anchor. From 1993-95, he worked at WQAM-AM in Miami as a talk show host and sports anchor.

Wischusen graduated from Boston College in 1993 with a Bachelor of Arts in communications. Additionally, Wischusen has aided the New York Jets Foundation and the Garden of Dreams Foundation, which is designed to help New York City kids in crisis.



NFL and College Football Analyst: Louis Riddick

Louis Riddick, one of the most well-respected voices in the industry, currently serves as an NFL and college football analyst across ESPN and ABC. The former pro scout and director of pro personnel, who also played in the NFL, originally joined ESPN in May 2013 as an NFL Front Office Insider. In addition to his NFL on ESPN booth role alongside play-by-play Chris Fowler, analyst Dan Orlovsky and reporter Laura Rutledge, he also pairs with play-by-play Bob Wischusen and reporter Kris Budden on ABC/ESPN Saturday football games.

Riddick initially teamed with play-by-play voice Steve Levy and analyst Brian Griese, on September 9, 2019, when they helped kick off MNF's 50th season and called the Denver Broncos-Oakland Raiders game for ESPN, and served as an MNF analyst starting in August 2020. Prior to joining the MNF booth, Riddick shared his insights on



MNF halftime and postgame shows, on Monday Night Countdown's main set, and called college football games on Friday nights alongside Dave Flemming and Paul Carcatterra.

In addition to his role on MNF, Riddick also contributes to ESPN's signature NFL shows: Sunday NFL Countdown, Monday Night Countdown and NFL Live, as well as SportsCenter and ESPN Radio. He is a key contributor to ESPN's coverage of Super Bowl week, the NFL Scouting Combine and the NFL Draft, where he has appeared on ESPN's main set for the entirety of the event since 2016. Riddick made his NFL Draft television debut in 2015 when he joined ESPN's main set for Round 1. He has also covered the NFL Draft on ESPN Radio (Rounds 2-3 in 2015 and Rounds 1-3 in 2014).

Riddick's NFL front office experience spanned more than a decade with the Washington Football Team and Philadelphia Eagles. He started as a pro scout in Washington (2001-04) before being promoted to director of pro personnel, a position he held for three years (2005-07). Riddick then joined the Eagles in 2008 as a scout. He was named assistant director of pro personnel in 2009, and, a year later, he was promoted to director of pro personnel (2010-13).

A ninth round draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers in 1991, Riddick played seven NFL seasons at safety. His career included stints with the Atlanta Falcons (1992 and 1996), Cleveland Browns (1993-95) and Raiders (1998), totaling 172 tackles and two sacks.

A native of Quakertown, Penn., Riddick graduated from the University of Pittsburgh with a bachelor of arts in economics. At Pitt, he was a four-year letterman, a two-time Academic All-America and a team captain his senior season. As an alumni, he was the keynote speaker at the Pitt Football Kickoff Luncheon in August 2018. Riddick was a USA Today and Parade Magazine All-American at Pennridge High School as a prep senior.

Sideline Reporter, College Sports: Kris Budden

Kris Budden is a college sports reporter for ESPN, working on football, basketball and baseball. She joins Bob Wischusen and Louis Riddick on one of the top crews every Saturday for ABC and ESPN's industry-leading college football coverage. She recently made her debut on grand slam tennis coverage with reporting duties at the US Open.

Prior to joining ESPN, Kris was a sideline and feature reporter for FOX Sports, covering NFL and college football from 2013-2015. During that time, Kris also worked for FOX Sports San Diego as a host and reporter for their coverage of the San Diego Padres.

Kris also spent six years at WBIR in Knoxville. Some of the notable events she covered included the 2012 London Olympics, NCAA men's and women's tournaments and Pat Summitt's retirement. She also won an Associated Press Best Sports Feature Award.

She has been recognized for her excellence in sports broadcasting, having received an Associated Press Award for Best Sports, as well as a regional Emmy for Best Talent in Sports in 2016.

Kris graduated from the University of Missouri. She and her husband currently reside in Dallas with their son and daughter.

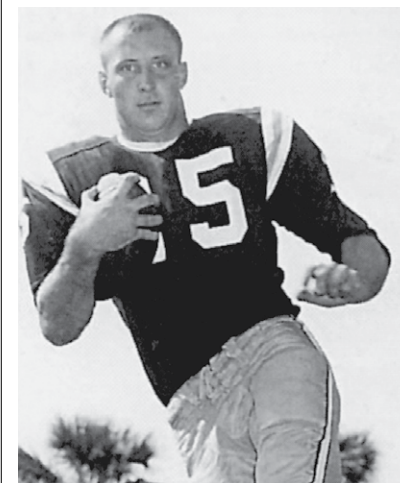

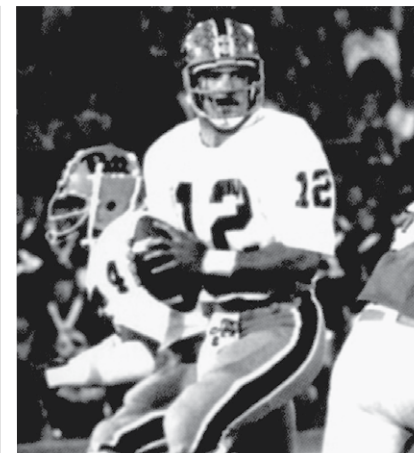

VIRGINIA HEAD COACH: TONY ELLIOTT

Tony Elliott is in his fourth season as the Fralin Family Head Football Coach at the University of Virginia. He was named the program's 41st head coach on Dec. 10, 2021, after spending 11 seasons at Clemson University – his alma mater – as an assistant coach under Dabo Swinney.



Elliott helped the Tigers win six Atlantic Coast Conference championships, make four College Football Playoff title game appearances and capture two national championships (2016 and 2018).

In his fourth season at UVA, Elliott has led the Cavaliers to just their second 10-win campaign (10-3), tying the 1989 team for the most victories in school history. UVA also finished alone atop the ACC regular-season standings for the first time, posting a 7-1 conference record, and earned a berth in the ACC Championship game for only the second time — and first since 2019. The Cavaliers' historic season propelled Elliott to national acclaim, highlighted by honors such as ACC Coach of the Year, AP ACC Coach of the Year, and the Bobby Ross Coach of the Year award, presented to the top coach in the Commonwealth of Virginia. He also became UVA's first-ever finalist

for the Eddie Robinson Award, which is presented annually by the Football Writers Association of America to the nation's most outstanding head coach.

With the support of the Virginia administration, donors and fans, Elliott has demonstrated his ability to adapt to the rapidly evolving landscape of college athletics while remaining committed to his stated vision of molding UVA into the nation's model college football program. Still heavily emphasizing the development of the high school student-athlete with 22 highly rated newcomers in his 2025 signing class, Elliott and his staff made a statement in the transfer portal by landing 32 additions to complete one of the deepest UVA rosters in recent memory. The 2025 transfer portal class was ranked No. 18 nationally by Rivals.com.

Elliott's first two seasons as a head coach were unlike any ever experienced by a



college coach. Near the end of his rookie campaign in 2022, a campus shooting took the lives of three UVA players – Lavel Davis Jr., Devin Chandler and D'Sean Perry. The remainder of the season was canceled, and Elliott faced unforeseeable and harrowing challenges.

The program was grieving, looking for purpose and a way forward. With faith, passion and determination, he found a way, a cause, and a purpose for the Cavaliers. Under Elliott's

leadership, the UVA football program has rejuvenated itself based on commitment, appreciation, dedication and love.

Elliott earned his bachelor's degree in industrial engineering from Clemson in 2002, where he was a first-team All-ACC Academic selection and a CoSIDA Academic District III member. He was also a recipient of the ACC's Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship.

Under head coach Tommy Bowden, Elliott came to Clemson as a walk-on wide receiver in the fall of 1999 and finished his career with four letters after appearing in 44 games. Swinney was his position coach his senior year (2003), when he was named a co-captain of a team that finished 9-4 and No. 22 in the final AP and USA Today rankings.

Born in Watsonville, Calif., Elliott and his wife, Tamika, have two sons, A.J. and Ace.

VIRGINIA GAME RECAPS

Game 1 • Virginia 48, Coastal Carolina 7

Virginia rolled to a 48-7 victory over Coastal Carolina in the season opener. Chandler Morris passed for two touchdowns, James Jackson and Kevon Gray each recovered a fumble, Caleb Hardy blocked a punt, Ethan Minter intercepted a pass, Cam Ross returned a kickoff 100 yards for a TD, Trell Harris had a spectacular one-handed 48-yard reception, Will Bettridge kicked two field goals, and Daniel Sparks averaged 64.7 yards on eight punts. Virginia totaled 454 yards on offense and held Coastal to 254 yards. The Chanticleers rushed for only 91 yards.

Game 2 • NC State 35, Virginia 31

Virginia's offense totaled 514 yards and 24 first downs in a rare non-conference clash. The Cavaliers, with a chance to pull out a dramatic comeback win, gave the ball away. With NC State leading 35-31, a 20-yard completion from quarterback Chandler Morris to wide receiver Cam Ross gave Virginia a first down at the Wolfpack 12. On the next play, Morris tried to hit tailback J'Mari Taylor, and defensive end Cian Slone picked off the pass in the end zone. UVA's defense gave up 416 yards and five touchdowns. The Wahoos recorded no sacks and had no takeaways. Taylor rushed for 150 yards and three touchdowns, and Morris completed 30 of 43 passes for 257 yards and one TD. Wideouts Trell Harris, Edrine and Ross combined for 18 catches, and UVA's offensive line didn't give up a sack for the second-straight game.

Game 3 • Virginia 55, William & Mary 16

Against William & Mary, UVA rolled to a 55-16 win before an announced crowd of 38,512. The 55 points were the most the Wahoos have scored since a 55-15 rout of Abilene Christian at Scott Stadium in November 2020. Davis, a wide receiver, and Perry, a linebacker, each scored a TD in that game. Two longstanding UVA records fell. Until Saturday, the 691 yards of total offense Virginia gained at Scott Stadium against Davidson

in 1968 ranked as the most in school history. The Hoos finished with 700 against the Tribe (1-2). Moreover, tailback Harrison Waylee opened the second-half scoring with a 97-yard touchdown run, the longest rush in program history. Mikell Simpson had set the previous mark on Jan. 1, 2008, when he had a 96-yard TD run against Texas Tech in the Gator Bowl. On defense, UVA allowed only 263 yards, 79 of which came on a touchdown pass from W&M quarterback Tyler Hughes to wideout Deven Thompson early in the second quarter.

Game 4 • Virginia 48, Stanford 20

Virginia finished with 590 yards on offense—384 passing and 206 rushing—and didn't turn the ball over. Standouts abounded for the Wahoos in their ACC opener, with quarterback Chandler Morris and wide receiver Trell Harris shining especially brightly. Morris completed 23 of 31 passes for 380 yards and four touchdowns. Three of those TD passes were to Harris. Harris finished with four receptions for 145 yards, and his three first-quarter TDs helped stake Virginia to a 21-7 lead. UVA's defense did its part, too, sacking quarterback Ben Gulbranson five times and holding tailback Micah Ford to 44 yards on 13 carries. A week earlier, Ford had rushed for 157 yards in the Stanford's ACC opener, a 30-20 win over Boston College.

Game 5 • Virginia 46, #8 Florida State 38 (2OT)

On fourth-and-12 from the Virginia 27-yard line, Florida State quarterback Thomas Castellanos threw a pass to the end zone. UVA cornerback Ja'Son Prevard came down with his second interception of the game. This one sealed the Cavaliers' 46-38 victory over the No. 8 Seminoles, and Prevard had barely gotten his hands on the football when a tidal wave of fans began flooding the field. The victory was the Wahoos' first over a top-10 opponent at Scott Stadium since 2005, when they knocked off No. 4 Florida State 26-21. It came nearly 30 years after the

Hoos handed No. 2 FSU its first conference loss as an ACC member, also at Scott Stadium. The Cavaliers nearly avoided overtime, but Florida State scored a touchdown on a fourth-down pass with 36 seconds left in the fourth quarter, and Jake Weinberg's extra point made it 35-35. The Noles got the ball first in overtime and had to settle for Weinberg's 36-yard field goal. Virginia's possession stalled, but Will Bettridge extended the game with a 39-yard field goal. In the second overtime, the Hoos had the ball first, and quarterback Chandler Morris ran 4 yards for his third rushing touchdown of the game. Under the rules of overtime, Virginia then had to attempt a 2-point conversion, and Morris passed to wide receiver Trell Harris in the back of the end zone to make it 46-38. The Noles got no closer than the 22 on the possession that followed, and Prevard's pick ended the game.

Game 6 • Virginia 30, Louisville 27 (OT)

After holding the Cardinals to a field goal on the first possession of overtime, the Wahoos needed only four plays to score the winning touchdown: a 14-yard completion from quarterback Chandler Morris to tight end John Rogers; a 2-yard run by tailback J'Mari Taylor, a 7-yard run by Morris, who had to leave the game after taking a hard hit on his carry; and, on third-and-1, a 2-yard run by Taylor on a direct snap from center Drake Metcalf. Taylor's eighth TD of the season lifted Virginia to a 30-27 victory and silenced the home fans in the crowd of 50,032. The Cavaliers improved to 5-1 overall, matching their win total from 2024. They're 3-0 in ACC play for the first time since 2007, and they ended a three-game losing streak in their series with Louisville. Virginia's offense came in averaging 539.6 yards per game. Louisville (4-1 overall, 1-1 ACC) held the Cavaliers to 237 yards Saturday, and 75 of those came on a second-quarter touchdown drive. But UVA's defense contributed two touchdowns—the first on a 60-yard return of a fumble by cornerback Donavon Platt, the second on linebacker Kam Robinson's 47-yard interception return—to help offset the offense's uncharacteristic struggles.

Game 7 • Virginia 22, Washington State 20

The Wahoos trailed 17-7 at the half, and the score

was 20-10 heading into the fourth quarter. But their defense shut down Wazzu the rest of the way, and their offense delivered when it had to. With 2:55 to play, Will Bettridge's second field goal, a 34-yarder, made it 20-20. His first, from 47 yards, had tied his career long and made it 17-10 with 8:38 left in the third quarter. After Bettridge tied the game, a blunder by the Cougars on the ensuing kickoff forced them to start their next possession at their 2-yard line, and Virginia's defense, with an assist from the fans at the south end of the stadium, did the rest. On third-and-11 from the 1, Washington State tried to run the ball, and linebacker Kam Robinson's hit on tailback Kirby Vorhees in the end zone resulted in a go-ahead safety with 2:41 remaining.

Game 8 • Virginia 17, North Carolina 16 (OT)

Trailing 17-16 against No. 16 Virginia, which had scored a touchdown on the first possession of overtime, UNC could have kicked an extra point to extend the game. Instead, the Tar Heels lined up at the 3-yard line and opted to try to win on a two-point conversion. The Cavaliers, who have grown comfortable in such tense situations, didn't flinch. Carolina quarterback Gio Lopez rolled to his right and passed to tailback Benjamin Hall in the right flat. After an initial hit by UVA cornerback Emmanuel Karnley on Hall along the right sideline, nickel back Ja'son Prevard, did the rest, stopping Hall inches from the goal line.

Game 9 • Virginia 31, Cal 21

For long stretches it looked like the Virginia Cavaliers might win comfortably for the first time since Sept. 20, when they hammered Stanford 48-20 at Scott Stadium. But with 45 seconds to play, UVA's lead was only three in this ACC road game, and the California Golden Bears had the ball at their 14-yard line. Kam Robinson picked off Cal quarterback Jaron-Keawe Sagapolutele's first-down pass and returned the interception 35 yards for a touchdown that sealed a 31-21 victory for No. 15 UVA. The pick-6 was his second of the season to match a single-season school record held by Randy Neal (1992 & 1994) and was the third of his career. At 8-1 overall, the Wahoos are off to their best start since 1990, and they're 5-0 in conference play after winning on the West

Coast for the first time. This also marks the first time in program history that the Hoos have won five straight ACC games in the same season. The contest was the first-ever football game between two of the nation's top public universities.

Game 10 • Wake Forest 16, Virginia 9

UVA suffered a painful defeat. The Cavaliers lost quarterback Chandler Morris to a second-quarter injury and fell 16-9 to ACC rival Wake Forest. On a night when Virginia's defense held the Demon Deacons without a touchdown, its offense turned the ball over three times and managed only three Will Bettridge field goals Saturday. Shaky special teams proved costly for Virginia too. Wake's lone touchdown came on an 88-yard punt return late in the first half. Wake totaled only 203 yards on offense, but the Wahoos failed to capitalize on their defense's dominance. For the Hoos, the loss was their first since Sept. 6 and will halt their national ascent, at least for a week. UVA was No. 12 in the Associated Press poll and No. 14 in the College Football Playoff rankings. UVA totaled 327 yards on offense, but 97 came on two plays: a 54-yard run by Daniel Kaelin, who replaced Morris at quarterback midway through the second quarter, and a 43-yard run by tailback J'Mari Taylor.

Game 11 • Virginia 34, Duke 17

When the two-minute timeout arrived in the fourth quarter, UVA had the ball in Duke territory with a commanding lead, and most of the home fans at Wallace Wade Stadium had long since departed. The game ended with the Cavaliers, leading 34-17, in victory formation, and the orange-clad fans in attendance roared their approval. Morris completed 23 of 35 passes for 316 yards and two touchdowns. He wasn't perfect—Morris threw two interceptions, one of which Duke returned for a fourth-quarter TD—but he led an offense that totaled 540 yards, its highest total since Virginia's 48-20 win over Stanford on Sept. 20. As impressive as the Hoos' offense was, their defense might have been better. Duke came in averaging 35.2 points and an ACC-best 312.9 passing yards per game. The Blue Devils totaled 50 yards and three first downs in the first

half Saturday. They finished with a season-low 255 yards against a swarming UVA defense that was missing its most dynamic player, linebacker Kam Robinson, for most of the game.

Game 12 • Virginia 27, Virginia Tech 7

The Wahoos regained possession of the Commonwealth Cup and ended a four-game losing streak in the series. A crowd of 58,832, savored the victory Saturday night. Virginia's defense held Tech to 197 yards, 57 of which came on quarterback Kyron Drones' touchdown pass to Shamarius Peterkin with 4:21 to play. The Hokies' six first downs were their fewest in a game since 1998, and UVA forced Drones into an abysmal performance. UVA's offense totaled 380 yards. Before giving way to his backup, Daniel Kaelin, in the fourth quarter, quarterback Chandler Morris completed 21 of 35 passes for 182 yards, and he wasn't intercepted. Tailback J'Mari Taylor rushed 20 times for 80 yards, giving him 997 for the season. He ran for the Cavaliers' first touchdown, on a direct snap from the 1-yard line, and passed for the second. On that play, Taylor took another direct snap, took a step forward and then pulled up and lofted a pass to tight end Sage Ennis in the end zone.

Game 13 • Duke 27, Virginia 20 (OT)

The Cavaliers were unable to win the second meeting in 21 days against Duke. Virginia played its fourth overtime game of the year, only the fifth FBS team ever to play four in the same season. Duke scored on fourth down of the first possession of overtime to go up 27-20, and that's how the game ended. As the result of a personal foul on the Blue Devils' touchdown, the Hoos had to begin their drive at the 40-yard line instead of the 25, and their possession lasted but a single play. Chandler Morris was intercepted on first down after getting the ball lateraled back to him on a trick play. Virginia tied the game with 22 seconds left in regulation on a 96-yard drive that culminated in Morris 18-yard touchdown pass to Eli Wood. The Cavaliers never led in the contest despite outgaining the Blue Devils 344-333, winning the first down battle 25-19 and holding Duke to 6-of-16 on third down.

MISSOURI HEAD COACH: ELI DRINKWITZ

A winner at every stage of his career, Eli Drinkwitz – considered one of college football's top offensive minds – was introduced as the University of Missouri's 33rd football head coach in December 2019. The 2025 campaign was his sixth running the Tigers' program and seventh season overall as a head coach.



With over 25 years of experience, Drinkwitz will be coaching in his 13th bowl game, including the 2011 BCS National Championship game. The 2023 Associated Press SEC Coach of the Year and Bear Bryant Award finalist, Drinkwitz brings a 46-28 record at MU (six seasons) and 58-29 overall mark as a head coach into the bowl game. Under his guidance, the Tigers have earned bowl berths in each of his first six seasons in Columbia, becoming the first coach in Mizzou history to accomplish that feat.

Entering the season, he's helped develop seven All-Americans and worked with 19 National Football League (NFL) draft selections as a head coach. Additionally, he's produced eight 1,000-yard rushers, after Ahmad Hardy's 1,560-yard season in 2025, five 3,000-yard passers and five 1,000-yard receivers throughout his career as a head coach and coordinator.

The 2025 Tigers have put together an 8-4 season headed into the bowl game with a No. 25 ranking in the Associated Press poll. The double-digit wins campaign was the second straight for the program. Mizzou went 4-4 in SEC games (15-9 in SEC games over the last three seasons).

Mizzou's track record of player development success was on full display at the 2025 NFL Draft, with three Tigers selected.

Armand Membou became MU's latest first-round selection, going No. 7 overall to the New York Jets, Membou was the 22nd Mizzou player to be drafted in the first round. Luther Burden III heard his name called the next night, going in the second round (39th overall) to the Chicago Bears. Marcus Bryant was taken in the seventh round by the New England Patriots.



Of the SEC's four new head coaches to begin work in the nation's toughest conference in 2020, Drinkwitz's 5-5 regular-season record was the league's

best, ahead of Ole Miss' Lane Kiffin (4-5), Mississippi State's Mike Leach (3-7) and Arkansas' Sam Pittman (3-7).

Drinkwitz took over the Tigers program following an impressive 2019 season at Appalachian State that saw the 20th-ranked Mountaineers win the Sun Belt Conference title en route to a 12-1 record.

Drinkwitz graduated magna cum laude and was the student body president at Arkansas Tech (bachelor's, education) before beginning his coaching career at the prep level in his hometown of Alma, Ark., in 2005. He and his wife, Lindsey (Sivils), have four daughters: Addison, Emerson, Ella and Parker Lynn.

MISSOURI GAME RECAPS

Aug. 8 – UCA

Quarterback Beau Pribula threw for two touchdowns and ran for two more in his Mizzou debut leading the Tigers to a resounding 61-6 victory over the Central Arkansas Bears before a sellout crowd of 57,321 at Memorial Stadium.

Pribula completed 23-of-28 passes for 283 yards while rushing 10 times for 65 yards. Ahmad Hardy rushed for 100 yards and a touchdown to pace the Tigers' ground attack while Kevin Coleman Jr. led all receivers with seven catches while Marquis Johnson added six receptions for 134 yards and a score.

The Tigers ran their record streak of home victories over non-conference opponents to 20 as The Mizzou defense limited the Bears to 227 total yards.

Sep. 6 – Kansas

The Missouri Tigers came from behind three times, rallying from deficits of 21-6, 24-21 and 31-28, on the way to a 42-31 victory over the Kansas Jayhawks in the StorageMart Border Showdown at a sold-out Memorial Stadium. It was Mizzou's 12th home win in a row, extending the program's longest home winning streak in more than 80 years.

Beau Pribula threw for 334 yards and three touchdowns while Jamal Roberts and Ahmad Hardy both cracked the 100-yard mark with Roberts going for 143 yards and a score while Hardy added 112 yards and a TD.

Missouri out-gained Kansas 595-254, including a 261-3 advantage on the ground. The Tigers converted 14-of-24 third-and-fourth-down plays, including 4-of-5 on fourth down, while the Jayhawks were 5-of-12. Missouri ran 86 plays to Kansas' 48 and led in time-of-possession 40:27 to 19:33.

Sep. 6 – Louisiana

In front of a sun-soaked and sold-out Memorial Stadium, No. 25 Mizzou extended its home winning streak to 13 games with a 52-10 victory over Louisiana, powered by a career performance by running back Ahmad Hardy.

The first-year transfer from Louisiana-Monroe trampled the Ragin' Cajuns for 250 rushing yards on 22 attempts and three touchdowns, producing the most rushing yards by any FBS player in a game this season and seventh-most in a single game in Mizzou history. MU finished with 427 rushing yards on 62 attempts. In his third start at quarterback for the Tigers, Beau Pribula shook off a first-half interception to finish an abbreviated day with 174 yards on 15-of-22 passing with two touchdowns. He also ran for a score. Kevin Coleman Jr. led Mizzou's pass catchers with eight receptions for 84 yards.

Sep. 20 – South Carolina

Coming from behind twice in the second half, No. 23 Mizzou football scored the night's final 11 points a 29-20 victory over South Carolina to reclaim the Mayor's Cup before the 16th consecutive sellout crowd (57,321) at Memorial Stadium.

Mizzou's defense suffocated the South Carolina rushing game, holding the Gamecocks to minus-9 rushing yards on 22 attempts, the fewest rushing yards the Tigers have allowed in an SEC game since joining the conference in 2012. Jamal Roberts ran 13 times for 76 yards and Pribula nine times for 72, giving Mizzou three 70-yard rushers in the same game for the first time since 2011. Mizzou averaged 5.9 yards per carry, rushing 48 times for 285 yards. Pribula was 16-of-27 passing for 171 yards, one TD and one interception.



Sep. 27 – UMass

Mizzou running back Ahmad Hardy ran for three touchdowns and posted his fifth consecutive 100-yard rushing game for the Tigers. QB Beau Pribula set school records for passing accuracy to pace No. 20 Mizzou a 42-6 Homecoming victory over the Massachusetts Minutemen at Memorial Stadium.

Hardy carried 24 times for 130 yards and scored a touchdown in each of the game's first three quarters. His five straight 100-yard rushing games tie former Tigers standout Joe Moore (1969) for the school record, and he became only the third Tiger since 1950 to score a touchdown in the season's first five games. Pribula completed 26-of-29 passes for 241 yards, one touchdown and one interception. His completion percentage of .897 is second only to Chase Daniel's .917 vs. Southeast Missouri in 2008. Pribula also completed 21 consecutive passes to set the school record. WR Kevin Coleman Jr. caught a career-high 12 passes for 108 yards.

Oct. 11 – Alabama

The No. 8 Alabama Crimson Tide used two critical fourth-down conversions late in the game to build a 10-point lead, then withheld a late rally by the No. 14 Missouri Tigers to claim a 27-24 victory at a sold-out Memorial Stadium. (57,321). QB Beau Pribula threw for 167 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. Freshman Donovan Olugbode led all receivers with 55 yards and a touchdown. Pribula rushed for 61 yards and a score while Ahmad Hardy added 52 yards and Jamal Roberts rushed for 50. The Tigers held the Crimson Tide's high-powered offense to 325 yards of total offense, including just 125 rushing yards. LB Josiah Trotter led MU with eight tackles. Damon Wilson II recorded two sacks and Zion Young added another.

Oct. 18 – Auburn

In his first career road start, Beau Pribula

ran for a three-yard touchdown in double overtime, followed by another stand from the Mizzou defense to give the No. 16 Tigers a 23-17 victory over Auburn at Jordan-Hare Stadium in Auburn, Alabama. With its sixth win of the season, Mizzou secured bowl eligibility.

Missouri fought from behind in the fourth quarter to tie the score at 17-17 on a three-yard touchdown run by Ahmad Hardy, his second rushing TD of the game, after Auburn committed two 15-yard penalties and Beau Pribula completed a 27-yard pass to Donovan Olugbode, who was MU's leading receiver with five receptions for 69 yards.

Defensive end Zion Young led Mizzou's relentless defensive front with two of the Tigers' five sacks as Auburn managed just 343 yards of total offense.

Oct. 25 – Vanderbilt

Mizzou's Kevin Coleman Jr. caught a 36-yard pass from Matt Zollers on the game's final play but he was inches short of the end zone as time expired and No. 10 Vanderbilt held on for a 17-10 victory over the No. 15 Tigers at FirstBank Stadium in Nashville. The Missouri defense kept Vandy quarterback Diego Pavia bottled up for most of the game, limiting him to 149 yards of total offense, but he ran scored from one yard out with 1:52 to play to provide the winning points for the Commodores. Zollers, in the game for injured starter Beau Pribula, got the Tigers into position before the final completion to Coleman, who caught seven passes for 109 yards and had 162 all-purpose yards, came up just short.

In relief of Pribula, Zollers completed 14 of 23 passes for 138 yards and a touchdown while Ahmad Hardy added 97 yards on the ground.

Nov. 8 – Texas A&M

Mizzou running backs Jamal Roberts and Ahmad Hardy both rushed for more than 100 yards, but it wasn't enough to offset No.



3 Texas A&M's balanced attack as the Aggies pulled away for a 38-17 win at sold-out Memorial Stadium. Roberts ran 17 times for 110 yards and a touchdown, while Hardy had 13 carries for 109 yards and a score, putting him over 1,000 yards for the season.

Freshman QB Matt Zollers completed just 7-of-22 passes for 77 yards while fellow frosh Donovan Olugbode caught three passes for a team-high 74 yards. A&M's Rueben Owens ran for 103 yards and QB Marcel Reed threw for 221 and two scores. MU linebacker Triston Newson led all tacklers with 11 stops while edge Darris Smith accounted for the Tigers only sack.

Nov. 15 – Mississippi State

Ahmad Hardy became just the second player in Mizzou history to rush for 300 yards and the Tigers defense scored twice as Mizzou closed out its home schedule with a 49-27 victory over Mississippi State before the 20th consecutive sellout at Memorial Stadium. Hardy carried 25 times for 300 yards – second only to Devin West's school record of 319 against Kansas in 1998 – and scored three touchdowns on runs of 72, 43 and 10 yards. He had 203 yards in the second half.

Mizzou's Toriano Pride Jr. and Marvin Burks Jr. each scored on interception returns in the second half – just the second time in school history that the Tigers had a pair of "pick-sixes" in the same game. Missouri's defenders stuffed the stat sheet. Burks had a team-leading 12 tackles to go with his interception return, and linebacker Khalil Jacobs also reached double figures with 10 stops. The defense recorded a season-high 13 tackles for loss.

Nov. 22 – Oklahoma

A blocked field goal followed by a long pass play in the second quarter changed the complexion of the game and allowed No. 8 Oklahoma to ride its highly-ranked defense to a 17-6 victory over No. 22 Mizzou at Gaylord

Family-Oklahoma Memorial Stadium.

Beau Pribula, in his first game back at quarterback since suffering a severe ankle injury four weeks ago, finished with 231 passing yards on 20-of-36 passing. Ahmand Hardy was bottled up for just 57 yards on 17 carries. The Tigers mounted a fourth-quarter charge as Pribula completed passes of 23, 37 and five yards to Kevin Coleman Jr. and faced a fourth-and-two at the OU 21. But Pribula's pass to the end zone went off Coleman's fingertips and the Sooners took over on downs. Mizzou moved into Oklahoma territory again in the game's final two minutes before Eli Bowen intercepted a pass at the OU 20-yard line.

The Missouri defense, led by linebacker Josiah Trotter's team-leading 13 tackles, held Oklahoma to 276 total yards; 138 in each half.

Nov. 29 – Arkansas

A fourth-quarter punt return for a touchdown by Mizzou's Kevin Coleman Jr. broke open a close game on a wet and windy day at Donald W. Reynolds Razorback Stadium and the Tigers' defense pitched a second-half shutout as Mizzou closed out the regular season with a 31-17 win over Arkansas.

The Tigers improved to 8-4 and 4-4 in the SEC, winning the Battle Line Rivalry Game for the fourth straight year. With the win, the Tigers also improved to 3-0 in rivalry trophy games this season, following victories over Kansas and South Carolina.

The Mizzou defense allowed Arkansas only 73 total yards in the second half and forced the Razorbacks three-and-out three times, each of which led to a Mizzou scoring play. Hardy, a finalist for the Doak Walker Award that goes to the nation's top running back, carried 27 times for 157 yards, pushing his season total to 1,560 yards – fourth most in Mizzou history. Jamal Roberts added another 100 yards and a touchdown as the cold, wet and windy conditions limited both team's passing attacks.
